Dear friends,

Prairie Sunset Trail users see the trail as a valuable local resource for wellness, natural beauty, and recreation. In keeping with that trust, Prairie Travelers felt compelled to maintain a high degree of visibility within the communities we serve.

We have increased our visibility and outreach over the past few years by posting actively on Facebook, updating our web page (<u>prairiesunsettrail.org</u>), updating our maps at the trailheads, becoming active with local government



bodies and participating in community events. We attend city council meetings and open house events, where we have the opportunity to offer input for new projects. We actively partner with local organizations on events, ranging from festivals to clinics teaching children to ride a bike.

In 2019 we:

- Purchased 4 new trailhead signs and 50 additional trail signs (at crossings and as guides) which are being installed along the entire 15 mile trail;
- Opened a crossing for trail users over the Cowskin Creek (with the City of Wichita);
- Actively participated in both Goddard and Wichita's Chamber of Commerce;
- Installed 8 additional benches at each ½ mile on the trail extension;
- Started work on the Memorial Brick Park at the Cecile Kellenbarger Memorial Trailhead in Goddard (see insert for information on purchasing a brick);
- Participated in several local festivals and community events;
- Worked with a local Goddard church on a volunteer workday with 50 people;
- Completed drainage work on the west and east side of 135th Street West;
- Started an additional drainage project west of 263rd, with additional limestone to be added;
- Attended Sunflower State Trails Appreciation Day in Topeka;

A Windy Wicked Wind 100K

The annual Wicked Wind ride lived up to its name this year! Winds did not deter the 250 riders who joined us for our annual spring fundraiser. This year, the ride included a new gravel route that utilized sections of the Prairie Sunset Trail. The ride also included a family ride around the lake and our traditional lunch, which featured many homemade goodies. This ride is co-sponsored by AARTI (Andover Augusta Rail Trail Initiative) and Prairie Travelers, and the ride raised \$3,500 for each trail.

And a Breezy Walnut Valley Metric

A brisk breeze greeted the 160 riders who rode the Walnut Valley Metric ride on the last Sunday in September. We offered three ride

options: 35 or 65 mile road rides, or a 42 mile gravel ride. This was the second year for the gravel ride and was again very popular. Lunch took place at the historic Liberty Schoolhouse, and gave riders an opportunity to mingle with old and new friends while enjoying homemade baked goods. This year, the ride



raised \$4,400 for the Prairie Sunset Trail.

These two events are the biggest fundraisers for our trail work. We are grateful for the 30+ volunteers who make it possible, including our volunteer bakers. Special thanks to Steve Richards at Blendrich Nutrition, Sprouts Farmers Market for the fruit, Jimmy John's for the chips, Paceline Products for the Chamois Butt'r samples, Heartsprings and the MS Society for snacks and supplies, and Bicycle Pedaler, Heartland Bicycle, Apostle Bikeworks for rider support.

Pawnee Prairie Ribbon Cutting & Pathway to Ride

In April, Prairie Travelers helped Bicycle Pedaler with Goddard's Pathway Church first annual "Pathway to Ride," an event to help children learn to ride without training wheels. Prairie Travelers distributed 50 green kids T-Shirts that said, "Happiness is the Prairie Sunset Trail." A week after the event, we got word that one of the kids who learned to ride his bicycle the weekend before rode the trail with his dad for the first time. A great reminder why these outreach activities are so important!

The ribbon cutting was part of District IV's \$1 million investment from the sale of the Hyatt. The funds were allocated towards enhancing horse and bicycle trails and playgrounds at the 400 acre Pawnee Prairie Park. This investment also included improving the bridges over the Cowskin Creek, including the one linking the Prairie Sunset Trail from Seville to Maize Road. This summer, limestone was washed away by the bridge over the Cowskin Creek, and was replaced by the City of Wich-



ita with larger stones that are more difficult to ride on. We have advocated to the City of Wichita to either pave or replace the limestone with something easier to ride on. For more information on the repairs, contact the Wichita Parks and Recreation Department, (316) 268-4361.

AARTI Update

Excitement is building as two potential projects for the Redbud Trail are taking shape.

- First is working being done by the City of Andover to link the trail across 13th Street to the already existing continuation of the Redbud Trail at Prairie Creek.
- Secondly, Sedgwick County is committed to completing the Redbud Trail from Woodlawn to 159th, and has placed the project on their CIP (Capital Improvement Project) list, which would extend the trail to 17 miles.

We continue to hope that the trail will be completed to Augusta soon, and have included that request in the Forward Kansas local consult meetings with Kansas Department of Transportation.

AARTI volunteers are relentless in their monthly workdays, keeping the trail in the best shape possible and helping with several annual fundraisers with Prairie Travelers. Volunteers have also been active in making sure that the trail remains on planning priority lists, and are passionate about community involvement.

Advocacy Updates

WAMPO Proposed Project Review

The Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WAMPO) has invited the public to help update their next long-range metropolitan transportation plan (MTP), which sets the vision and strategy for all regional transportation decision making for the next 20 years. It also included a Wichita Transit Bicycle Master Plan Update. The time to express our desire for a connection between the Prairie Sunset Trail and the Redbud Trail is now! Forward Kansas



A series of regional meetings in 2019 gave Kansans the opportunity to help shape the future of the state's next long-range transportation plan, including a Bike/Ped Program. The initiative is called "FORWARD Kansas." These meetings will guide investments from 2020 to 2045. KDOT's Secretary of Transportation, Julie Lorenz, and her staff have been coordinating the

meetings with the goal of getting programs in the active stage of completion with a two-year system of evaluation and progression rather than a 10 year wait.

Several of our Prairie Travelers and AARTI representatives have attended sessions in the Wichita area and shared our needs in writing. Our concerns are: retaining the bridge over the Big Ditch by the Prairie Sunset Trail, and, on the east side, the construction of the bridge over Kellogg and the Whitewater River to complete the Redbud Trail to Augusta.

Their willingness to come with open minds and sort out priorities has been very encouraging. While the local consult meetings are ending this month, you can still contact Mike Moriarty, KDOT Chief of Transportation Planning, at Michael.Moriarty@ks.gov with additional questions or concerns.
